


2019-2020 School Budget Vote & BOE Election

Dear Hannibal Central School District residents,

The Board of Education and Administration have worked closely together over the past several months to develop a budget for the Hannibal Central School District that supports the many aspects of our school district and is fiscally responsible to our taxpayers.



For the 2019-2020 school year we will be receiving \$25,500,996 in state aid, which will pay for roughly 75% of the budget. The community is being asked to provide a levy increase of a half percent (0.5%), or \$33,218. Any remaining monies will be paid through additional revenue sources. For an average home valued at \$75,000, the increase in school taxes would be approximately \$5.31 for the year. This total may vary, up or down, depending on the township in which you live. This amount will be determined in August when New York State issues equalization rates and final assessments for all the communities that make up our district.

On April 10, 2019, the Board voted to approve a spending plan of \$34,216,000. Roughly eighty-five (85%) percent of the budget increase represents the growth in programmatic opportunities directly afforded to our students. The spending plan supports the District's goals and learning needs of all

students, enhancing programs, as well as transportation costs, the upkeep and maintenance of our buildings and property, salaries, benefits, and retirement costs for all district employees. When you come in to vote, we are asking you to consider several items:

- Proposition #1 Vote on 2019-2020 Hannibal Central School District Budget.
- Proposition #2 Purchase New School Buses.
- Proposition #3 Approval of the use of funds from the Transportation Reserve Fund.
- Proposition #4 Elect Members of the Board of Education (2 seats available).



Budget at a Glance

The state legislation which requires the state's school districts to have a public budget vote, includes the requirement that the budget be divided into three components: program/ instruction, capital, and administration.

Program/Instruction (67.67%)

The Program Component represents the largest portion and focal point of our budget. Items contained have represented the "heart" of any educational system.

Capital (19.39%)

The Capital Component is defined by the State Education Department as primarily the operations and maintenance section of the budget; however, debt service and a couple of special items are also included.

Administrative (12.94%)

The Administrative Component provides the funding of the majority of the instructional support services in the district. It is comprised of the general support section, an instructional supervision section and the employee benefits attributed to those areas, including retiree benefits.

What is on the Ballot?

2019-2020 Budget Propositions

Proposed Budget: Shall the Board of Education authorize the proposition of Proposition 1 voters' approval on May 21, 2019, for expending the sum of \$34,216,000 for the 2019-2020 school year for school purposes and levy the necessary tax thereof?

Purchase of School Buses and Vans: Shall the Board of Education purchase and

finance six (6) school buses and two (2) passenger vans at an estimated cost not to exceed \$800,000, including necessary furnishings, fixtures and equipment and all other costs incidental thereto and to expend a total sum not to exceed \$800,000, which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof?

Note: This proposition is part of the District's fleet replacement plan which ensures safe, reliable transportation for our students by annually surplusing older, less efficient buses. The district receives 90% state aid on these purchases.

Proposition 3 —

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to use \$250,000 from the Transportation Reserve Fund, approved by the District's voters on May 19, 2015, to finance the acquisition of six school buses and two vans, including furnishings, fixtures and equipment, and all other costs incidental thereto?

Proposition 4 —

To elect a total of two (2) members to the Board of Education; Two (2) for a threeyear term commencing July 1, 2019 and expiring on June 30, 2022.

Two (2) residents have submitted petitions for election to the Board of Education. The candidates are listed below in the order in which they will appear on the ballot:

What Might My School Tax Bill Look Like?

On May 21, all qualified voters in our school district will have the opportunity to vote on the 2019-2020 school budget of \$34,216,000. The budget contains a 0.5% increase in the total tax levy.

For property owners, your full value tax rate would increase approximately 12 cents per \$1,000.

Who Can Vote?

According to New York Education Law, in order to vote, you must be:

- \sqrt{A} citizen of the United States
- $\sqrt{18}$ years of age
- \sqrt{A} A resident of the district for at least 30 days
- You do not have to be registered to vote.
- You do NOT have to own property in the district, but you MUST reside in the district.
- Identification and proof of residence WILL be requested at the time of voting.

There have been provisions made for those eligible for Absentee Ballot. Applications may be obtained between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, from the District Clerk. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be issued to the voter in person.

KINDERGARTEN & PRE-K REGISTRATION • FALL 2019

UPK and Kindergarten registration packets were mailed April 1.

Students who attend HCSD UPK will automatically be enrolled in kindergarten. If your child does not attend UPK, please contact our District Registrar Erica Davis at 315-564-8100, ext. 5008 and she will send you the registration forms.

Children must be 5 years old on or before December 1, 2019 to be eligible to attend kindergarten.

Children must be 4 years old on or before December 1, 2019 to be eligible to attend UPK.

PARENTS, mark your calendar for June 21st as the UPK and Kindergarten (if not already enrolled in UPK at HCSD) screening date.

All students entering Kindergarten and Pre-K must:

- provide proof of residence
- meet all New York State immunization reauirements
- have a completed physical
- provide birth certificate/proof of age
