2025-2026 BUDGET PROPOSAL

Dear Hannibal Community,

On behalf of the Board of Education, I would like to extend our sincere gratitude for your continued support of the robust educational opportunities we provide for our students. As we prepare for the 2025–2026 school year, our commitment remains steadfast: to deliver an exceptional educational experience that empowers students to thrive as productive citizens in an ever-evolving world.

As part of this mission, we offer a wide array of academic programs, extracurricular activities, and comprehensive support services. From tailoring reading instruction to foster early literacy at Fairley Elementary, to offering college-level coursework taught by our dedicated teachers, every initiative is centered on the growth and success of our students. We are proud to cultivate a safe, high-quality learning environment where students are encouraged to explore their passions and develop the skills essential for their future.

We are pleased to share that there will be no reductions in student programs, support services, or enrichment opportunities. In fact, we are expanding resources to better meet the diverse needs and interests of our students. This continued investment reflects our unwavering dedication to their success.

To responsibly manage the financial needs of the district while minimizing the burden on our taxpayers, we are strategically utilizing our fund balance. The proposed 1.9% tax levy increase — which remains within the allowable tax cap — demonstrates our commitment to maintaining

excellence without overextending our community.

In addition, the proposed budget includes \$100,000 for capital improvements, in line with NYSED guidelines that allow districts to receive building aid on approved projects up to this amount annually. These funds will support essential exterior envelope improvements (i.e., masonry) at Fairley Elementary, helping to maintain the building's integrity, enhance energy efficiency, and prevent more extensive and costly repairs in the future.

Proposition 2 supports the district's ongoing fleet replacement plan, which ensures safe and reliable transportation for our students. Each year, the district purchases new buses and retires older, less efficient models to maintain a dependable and cost-effective fleet. The state reimburses the district for 90% of these purchases through transportation aid. It is important to note that Proposition 2 does not include the purchase of any electric vehicles; all buses and vehicles acquired, if approved, will be gas- or diesel-powered.

BUDGET VOTE & BOE ELECTION:

May 20, 2025

You may vote in-person, noon to 8 p.m. at Hannibal High School, or by absentee or early voting ballot. It is advised that voters request an absentee or early ballot (if not voting in-person) no later than May 13.

To ensure timely delivery and receipt, please mail your completed absentee or early ballot to the district clerk by May 15, or hand-deliver it to the district clerk by 5 p.m. May 20. Please call 315-564-8100, ext. 8 for more information.

QUALIFIED VOTERS MUST:

- · Be a citizen of the United States
- · Be at least 18 years of age
- Be a resident of the District for a period of at least 30 days prior to the day of the vote
- Not be disqualified by any reason set forth in NYS Election Law §5-106.

WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT?

2025-2026 Budget Propositions

PROPOSITION 1

Shall the Board of Education authorize the proposition of voters' approval on May 20, 2025, for expending the sum of \$42,581,000 for the 2025-2026 school year for school purposes, and levy the necessary tax thereof?

PROPOSITION 2

Shall the Board of Education of the Hannibal Central School District be authorized to purchase two (2) school buses, each with wheelchair lifts, including necessary furnishings, fixtures and equipment and all other costs incidental thereto, and one (1) student transportation vehicle, and to expend a total sum not to exceed Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) which is estimated to be the maximum amount necessary to purchase the two (2) buses and one (1) student transportation vehicle, and shall the Board be authorized to pay for the school buses and student transportation vehicle by expending up to \$200,000 from the 2021 transportation reserve fund, together with the remaining necessary balance not to exceed \$400,000 paid from the 2024-2025 and/or 2025-2026 budget appropriations?

Proposition 2 continues the District's annual bus replacement plan to ensure safe, reliable transportation by retiring older vehicles and purchasing new gas- or diesel-powered models. No electric vehicles are included in this proposition.

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

Three members will be elected to the Board of Education; two (2) for a three-year term commencing July 1, 2025 and expiring on June 30, 2028, and one (1) for a one-year term commencing May 21, 2025 and expiring on June 30, 2026. The two candidates receiving the most votes will assume the three-year terms and the candidate with the third highest votes will assume the partial term.


